

Our Lady of Mount Carmel

Today, July 16th would have been the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Because the day falls on Sunday, Our Lady's Feast Day falls out of the calendar in favor of the Lords' Day. Nevertheless, it does us well to take a look at this beautiful day in honor of Our Lady.

We begin by saying that it is the patronal feast of the Carmelite Order. This Order of men and women possesses the deepest spirituality in the Church. Some of its illustrious saints are: St. John of The Cross (Dec. 14th), St. Theresa of Avila (Oct. 15th) and St Therese of Lisieux (Oct. 1st) or "The Little Flower". The Carmelite Order was the preference of choice of Karol Wojtyla, who so desired to be a Carmelite priest, but instead became a priest of the Archdiocese of Krakow, Poland. In 1978 he became Pope John Paul II (1978-2005). However, he lived a life almost as a Carmelite, giving into deep, quiet prayer each day. His dissertation (wrote a book) was on the spirituality of the Carmelite, St. John of The Cross. St. John Paul II went to confession frequently. He always confessed to a Carmelite priest.

The Carmelites were Christian Hermits living in Palestine in the late 12th (1100's) and 13th (1200's) centuries. They lived on Mount Carmel overlooking breathtaking vistas of the Mediterranean Sea. The importance of Mount Carmel is found in 1 Kings 18 with the Prophet Elijah's confrontation with the false prophets of Baal (pronounced: Bail or Bahl). It is mentioned as a "holy mountain" in 16 (B.C.) according to Egyptian records. The mountain was a center of idol pagan worship.

Individual Christian hermits settled on the mountains in the early 6th century (500's). They established a monastery in 1150 A.D. A <u>Hermit</u> is one who lives a secluded prayer-focused Life taking the three evangelical counsels of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

The rule of the Carmelite Order was approved in the church by Pope Honorius III (1216-1227) in 1226. Shortly after, the Muslims invaded the monastery and some of the hermits fled to Aylesford, England. In 1247 Fr. Simon Stock joined the Carmelite Order in England. It is said he was elected Superior of the Order at age 82, in 1251. The Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to Simon Stock holding the baby Jesus and a brown scapular. The Virgin Mary said to Simon: "Receive, my beloved son, this habit of your Order: this shall be to you and all Carmelites a privilege, that whosoever dies clothed in this shall never suffer eternal fire/"

In 1726. Pope Benedict XIII inserted the Feast Day in honor of Our Lady into the Universal Catholic calendar to be celebrated on July 16th. Pope Sixtus IV (1471-1484) established the Third Order of Carmelites (existing to this day) as a lay order of men and women.

Description of Jesus

In the time of Jesus there lived two very prominent historians. One was the Jewish historian, Josephus (pronounced: Jo-see-fuss) and the renowned Roman historian, Tacitus (pronounce: (ta-chee-tus) both of these historians wrote about Jesus' character and personality. According to the protestant scripture scholar, William Barclay (again, accepted in Catholic circles) there was a description of Jesus given by the Roman Governor of Jerusalem at the time. His name was Lentulus and the description is as follows. It must be noted that William Barclay writes that it may be a forgery. Nevertheless, it's an interesting read.

"There has appeared here in our time, and still lives here, a man of great power named Jesus Christ. The people call him a prophet of truth, and his disciples the Son of God. He raises the dead and cures the sick. He is in stature a man of middle height and well proportioned. He has a venerable face, of a sort to arouse both fear and love in those who see him. His hair is the colour of ripe chestnuts, smooth almost to the ears, but above them waving and curling, with a slightly bluish radiance, and it flows over his shoulders. It is parted in the middle on the top of his head, after the fashion of the people of Nazareth. His brow is smooth and very calm, with a face without wrinkle or blemish, lightly tinged with red. His nose and mouth are faultless. His beard is luxuriant and unclipped, of the same colour as his hair, not long but parted at the chin. His eyes are expressive and brilliant. He is terrible in reproof, yet and gentle in admonition, cheerful without ceasing to be grave. He has never been seen to laugh, but ofter to weep. His figure is slender and erect; his hands and arms are beautiful to see. His conversation is serious, sparing and modest. He is the fairest of the children of men.

July is The Month of The Precious Blood of Jesus

We may think of July as "the quiet month" because all meetings are not held in the parish church and most people focus on vacation. In our part of the country we also experience intensive muggy days, know to us sometimes as "dog days".

In the Church we celebrate the Feast of Sts. Anne and Joachim (July 26th) and the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel (July 16th) and the Precious Blood of Jesus (July 1st).

How did this come about? It was during the first Italian war for independence in 1849. Blessed Pope Pius (1846-1878) was exiled from Rome to Gaeta, Italy. He went there accompanied by a certain Don (Fr.) Giovanni Merlini, Superior General of the fathers of The Most Precious Blood.

Father Merlini suggested to Blessed Pius to establish a universal feast day in honor of the Precious Blood of Jesus. Thus asking God to end the war and bring peace to Rome. Blessed Pius IX established the Feast of the Precious Blood of Jesus on July 1, 1849. Soon the war did end and Pope Pius IX returned to Rome. Pope St.. Pius X (1903-1914) officially proclaimed July 1st as the Feast Day of The Precious Blood of Jesus. Incidentally, we do not celebrate the Precious Blood of Jesus on July 1st as for us, it is the Feast Day of St. Junipero Serra, founder of the State of California. However, Vatican II (1962-19665) established that the Feast in honor of the Precious Blood can be celebrated on any day in July that doesn't honor a Saint.

We are encouraged, by the Church to meditate on the profound sacrifice of Jesus and the pouring out of His blood on the Cross for all.

<u>Prayer in Honor of the</u> <u>Most Precious Blood of Jesus</u>

O God, who by the Precious Blood of your only Begotten Son have redeemed the whole world, preserve in us the work of your Mercy, so that, ever honoring the mystery of our salvation , we may merit to obtain its fruits admitted to your sacred table, O Lord, we have with joy drawn water from the fountains of the Savior:: O may His Blood we beg you, become within us a fountain of water springing up to eternal life. Amen
